### **Auslan coffee shops a sign of the times**

Friends and families of deaf and hard of hearing children now have the opportunity to practise their signing skills over a latte at one of several coffee shops across Australia.

Due to their success in Victoria, four more coffee shop sessions have been added in Brisbane, Hobart, Newcastle and Canberra.

Deaf Children Australia introduced the Auslan coffee shops so that families and friends of deaf and hard of hearing children could meet and learn to sign in a relaxed environment.

More than 90 per cent of deaf and hard of hearing children are born into families who have little or no experience of deafness. Given that the majority of profoundly deaf children grow up to use sign language and that most parents of deaf children have no prior knowledge of sign language, deaf children are prone to significant delays in developing language. It is therefore in the family's best interest that the parents learn to sign with their children.

For one hour each week, families and friends of deaf children are encouraged to fine-tune their Auslan skills with a deaf tutor at a coffee shop in their area.

The service is free - all they pay for is the coffee. A basic understanding of the language is required.

Trisha Balharrie, Auslan Education Officer at Deaf Children Australia says: "It has been a great turnout and many parents have commented how much it is benefiting their skills in Auslan. It is also a fabulous way for parents of deaf children to meet, share their experiences and approach the future with greater confidence."

Damian Lacey, CEO of Deaf Children Australia says: "Our vision at Deaf Children Australia is that deafness is no barrier. These coffee shops will help bridge the communication gap between hearing families and their deaf children."

Deaf Children Australia has been providing information, advocacy, support services and educational resources to enrich the lives of deaf and hard of hearing children and young adults for 144 years. Deaf Children Australia represents the needs of 16,000 deaf and hearing impaired children throughout Australia. As a not-for-profit organisation, their service is made possible with the support of volunteers, the community, businesses and government financial grants.
